



God With Us

I am a firm believer in God-incidences, God-winks, or whatever you like to call them. You know, those feelings that you should do something; write a letter to a friend or phone a neighbour, perhaps, only to find that that bit of human contact was exactly what was needed at that time. I, myself, was fortunate enough to experience two incidents of this type fairly recently.

On 29th December, soon after my son and daughter had had to return to their respective homes after Christmas, I looked through the window only to see a small patch of vivid pink in a bush. It was a fully open camellia, a reminder that all things happen in God's time, but He is with us always. Then, only a few weeks ago, a friend gave me a present for no reason; no birthday, no anniversary and no special occasion. But that beautiful gift could not have been better timed or more appropriate for raising my spirits and making me feel loved and wanted. And yet neither she nor anyone else, as far as I am aware, knew that I was feeling low and a little bit lost at that time. But God knew, and surely this was a deliberate prompt.

God does not, however, restrict his promptings to this type of situation. This realisation was created by one of my Advent readings in Revd Chris Morley's, "The Heart of Christmas." He tells us about a movement called, "In Praise of Slow" started by Carl Honore, and goes on to say, "Many of us, these days, rush through life. Often the first thing we do on waking is to look at the clock, and we keep our eye on timepieces of one sort or another throughout the day. Many of us keep mental lists of what needs to be done and feel anxious if we "get behind. The New Testament's word for this approach to time is "chronos", but more important than clock time are times of particular significance or "kairos" moments, times when God reveals himself in large or small ways. The most important of these is the coming of Jesus. Not being so anxious about chromos will make us more ready to spot a kairos."

On Christmas Eve, I was walking with my daughter in Betws-y-Coed. As the path went up onto the edge of the golf-course, we became aware of a small bird fluttering about in a bush that was hardly more than a bunch of twigs, only about a metre away from us. To our amazement, not only was it completely unperturbed by our presence as we stood and watched it, but also it was indeed a small bird, a goldcrest, together with the related firecrest the UK's smallest bird, typically measuring only 3.5 inches, half an inch less than the wren! The tiny size of the bird contrasted vividly with the huge expanse of wall-to-wall blue sky and beautiful sunshine we were also enjoying. What a wonderful example this contrast in size gave us of the scope of God's creative power!

But there was more to come: on Boxing Day we went to Llyn Crafnant, and as we walked round the lake, we were struck by the greenness of it all. The grass verges that lined the road were verdant, the trees festooned with hanging swathes of greyish green, and even the rocks wore a veneer of yellowish green. The picture that was painted in various shades of green was truly beautiful. Our God does not need a wide variety of colour to prove the extent and variety of his creative powers.

So, Godincidence, Godwink or kairos moment: you chose the name, but all exist to prove God's promise, "Surely I am with you always." (Matthew 28, v.20)

Online Event: Is the Cost of Living Support Enough?

We are already experiencing a cost of living crisis. Families in the UK who were just about managing to make ends meet are being pulled into poverty by the rapidly rising costs of living. In the Autumn, fuel prices are expected to skyrocket and food costs mount up whilst the pressures of cold weather increase. But the social security net isn't providing enough support for people who need it. Despite emergency payments to low-income families from government, millions are still experiencing a major shortfall in their finances.

The Joint Public Issues Team have been working on a report (currently embargoed) that will be launched on Aug 7*. Over 40 faith groups and charities have signed in support of the report and are calling on the new Prime Minister to make this a priority once in office.

Join the Joint Public Issues Team and Church Action on Poverty for a conversation on Wednesday August 10th about the crisis we find ourselves in and what next steps are needed for families to receive sufficient support. We'll hear from people with first-hand experience of poverty, explore how churches are already in the midst of offering emergency provision and discuss the next steps for government in the light of the report.
